


The Christian Writer Is A Minister

A. A minister is a servant


- 1) A minister is a servant to the Master and not the audience *Hebrews 5⁴, 2 Corinthians 1¹, Galatians 1¹⁰*

B. A minister is sent

1) Do not write what you want to write *Romans 16¹⁸*

2) Do not write what people want you to write *1 Samuel 15²⁴*

3) Write only what you are sent to write *2 Corinthians 4²*

✓ *How feasible is it to stick to only what you are sent to write?*

4) Search out what is on God's mind to be expressed through your writing Acts 22¹⁵; 26¹⁶

✓ *What are the hindrances to expressing God's mind?*

C. A minister is dependent on the Master

1) The support of the Master is required to write with precision and accuracy Colossians 1^{22,29}

✓ *Why is the writer's skill not enough?*

2) The support of the Master is required to bring sense out of the writings 1 Corinthians 1^{22,23}

✓ *Why does God use foolishness as wisdom?*

3) The support of the Master is required to communicate via the writings *Luke 24⁴⁵, Acts 8³⁰⁻³⁵*

✓ *Why do people misinterpret the message?*

4) The support of the Master is required to generate the appropriate response *Acts 2³⁷; 16¹⁴*

D. A minister is a representative

4) Write as the oracle of God Romans 1⁵, 1 Peter 4¹¹

E. A minister addresses and meets the needs of his audience

1) Write to attend to their needs and not wants Isaiah 61¹⁻⁴, 1 Corinthians 4¹, 12⁴⁻⁷
